Understanding Key Figures in Greek Mythology

Your job: You will be assigned a figure of Greek Mythology. After completing some research on this figure, you will create two products that convey the most essential information about your figure to your audience. Your audience will be your classmates who will view your pieces during a gallery walk in class.

Step-by-Step Directions:

- 1. Research your figure using only credible sources (preferably those found on MEL).
- 2. Create a **Key Information piece** to convey the most important facts regarding your figure. This piece may be formatted as a small poster, keynote presentation, or printed information page. <u>The writing must be your own</u> and should be written in an easy-to-understand, informational style. Be sure to include relevant information like that in the list below:
 - Name and title(s)
 - Key characteristics (strengths/weaknesses)
 - Physical description, image
 - Associated symbols
 - Summary of well-known myth(s)
 - Genealogy and other relationships
 - MLA formatted citations for any sources you use*

*At least one citation is required.

- 3. Create a **Creative Expressions piece** to convey additional interesting information and to reinforce our understanding of this figure. Use the list on the back of this page to help you brainstorm possible formats for this piece. Again, <u>any writing must be your own</u>. For this piece your format should dictate the style in which you write.
- 4. Both pieces must be completed in final-draft format. On the day of the gallery walk, _____, they must be ready-to-go. You will not have a chance to print that day in class.
